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## Program Overview

### Purpose

The Solutions Program aims to support collaborative and engaged research for the development and implementation of innovations to address timely Saskatchewan health needs and create a sustainable impact in a focused area. All applications must address one or more of the health challenges (i.e., focus area) identified for the competition year.

### Structure

For each competition year, the Solutions Program offers a selection of focus areas and funding opportunities to support research at various stages, including partnered investments. Principal Applicants are permitted one (1) application to the Solutions Program per competition year, regardless of focus area or funding opportunity.

Applicants must select the funding opportunity (i.e., grant type) where the objective best suits the nature of the proposed research (i.e., stage of idea, project goals, etc.). Proposal fit with funding opportunity and focus area will be considered in the peer review process.

### Funding Opportunities

#### Innovation Grant

**Amount:** \$50,000

**Term:** 1-year

**Objective:** Support interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary teams including knowledge-users to catalyze innovative new ideas and approaches, promoting creative problem solving to address one of the focus areas named in this year's competition.

#### Impact Grant

**Amount:** \$150,000

**Term:** 2-years

**Objective:** Support interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary teams including knowledge-users to advance the translation of research into real world settings and practical applications to address one of the focus areas named in this year's competition.

### 2022-23 SHRF Funding Available

A total of \$1,000,000 is available for applications to the SHRF Focus Areas. Partner investments are in addition as noted in partner opportunity details.

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## Focus Areas

In the 2022-23 competition year, SHRF has funding available for two distinct focus areas: Addictions and Virtual Care. Within each focus area, there are partner investments where applicants have the option to address the partner's additional requirements related to the two focus areas.

### Virtual Care

Virtual care (i.e., remote medicine, digital care, tele-health) has the potential to connect patients to the care they need, when and where they need it. It may also serve to enhance coordination and quality of care. In Saskatchewan, this is especially crucial for those who face transportation, mobility, location or other challenges in accessing care. The ethical, innovative and effective use of virtual care has many potential impacts such as: improving patient/client's experiences and outcomes; ensuring safe and equitable access to high-quality care; enhancing efficiency and appropriateness of care and reducing costs; enhancing team-based care; and improving communication and coordination between care providers and sectors - from public health promotion to community care, acute care and long-term care.

To achieve these impacts, we are asking the research community and their partners to come together to understand and address questions, tackle challenges and develop evidence related to: 1) evidence-informed practice in delivering virtual care; 2) developing, validating and implementing tools and applications, including artificial intelligence, to enable virtual care; 3) issues of governance, policies and workflow; and privacy and confidentiality; 4) continuing provider education, patient empowerment and culturally responsive care; and/or 5) individual and systemic barriers to uptake by patients and providers, as well as the implementation in the larger system.

### 2022-23 Virtual Care – Optional Partner Opportunities

SHRF partners with other organizations who share an interest in funding excellent health research aimed to improve the lives and wellbeing of Saskatchewan residents. Partner funding will be allocated to projects that meet the following partner requirements:

Mental Health Research Canada (MHRC) is a national charitable organization that is dedicated to improving the lives of all Canadians by advancing mental health knowledge and research that has the high potential for bettering the lives of Canadians, and for bridging the gap between research and practice. MHRC is interested in supporting research relevant to the virtual care focus area and the mental health needs of Saskatchewan's population.

Research teams must partner with one or more Saskatchewan-based service provider(s) or community organization(s) with direct experience in the proposed research and interest in its intended outcomes, and the research team must include one or more **persons with lived experience** relevant to the mental health aspect being studied.

The Centre for Aging + Brain Health Innovation (CABHI) is a unique collaboration of healthcare, science, industry, not-for-profit, and government partners whose aim is to help improve quality of life for the world's aging population, allowing older adults of all backgrounds and abilities to age safely in the setting of their choice while maintaining their cognitive, emotional, and physical well-being.

CABHI's mission is to accelerate the development, validation, commercialization, dissemination, and adoption of innovative products, services, and best practices to support aging and brain health. CABHI is interested in supporting research relevant to the virtual care focus area.

## Addictions

Addictions is a pressing health concern for all of Saskatchewan. Understood as compulsive behavior and/or substance use, despite negative or harmful consequences, addictions is driven by a combination of complex health, social and systemic factors with its impact reaching far and wide into our personal and social lives. By working together and including those with lived/living experiences, we can ensure that: services provide the necessary supports; resources are accessible to those who need them, including marginalized populations; and the continuum care is supported within the healthcare system and within other related systems such as policing, corrections and social services.

We are asking research teams to identify innovative and impactful approaches to address gaps throughout the entire addictions trajectory, which could include: education, prevention, screening, harm reduction, treatment and/or recovery strategies, through addressing questions and challenges, and developing evidence related to: 1) evidence-informed practice and patient-oriented care; 2) developing, validating and implementing strategies for treatment, recovery, or prevention of substance use from becoming harmful, including unmanaged pain, marginalization and environmental factors; 3) policy and health system improvements and communication; 4) individual and systemic barriers to access and uptake; and/or 5) patient empowerment and culturally responsive care. The inclusion of those with lived/living experiences to guide projects and ensure the appropriateness of proposed approaches is strongly encouraged.

### 2022-23 Addictions – Optional Partner Opportunities

The Saskatchewan Centre for Patient-Oriented Research (SCPOR) is a partnership of organizations that are dedicated to supporting patient-oriented research (POR) across Saskatchewan. Patient Partners, including patients, their families, informal caregivers and sometimes communities, contribute expertise gained from life experience. SCPOR works with Patient Partners to provide the supports and services needed to advance patient-oriented research in Saskatchewan to achieve enhanced patient outcomes, improved patient and care-provider experiences, increased population health and lower health system costs. SCPOR is committed to meaningful inclusion of diverse voices and culturally safe practices in research and training. Together, patients, researchers, healthcare providers and decision makers work collaboratively to build a sustainable, accessible, and more equitable healthcare system.

SCPOR provides a set of supports, both during the application phase and to Solutions SCPOR partnership grant recipients. Supports fall into the following four categories: Patient Engagement, Indigenous Research and Engagement Expertise, Data and Data Services and Capacity Development. ## [Eligibility for SCPOR Partnership Funding](#)

### [Topic area and approach](#)

Projects must focus on patient-identified priorities to improve patient outcomes and engage patients as partners throughout the process. The knowledge generated from SCPOR partnered projects are intended to improve health care systems and practices, leading to greater quality, accountability and accessibility of care.

### [Team membership requirements](#)

Teams must include a **minimum of two Patient Partners** who have personal lived experience with the health issue as Co-Applicants. These individuals could be patients, informal caregivers, family members or friends ([SPOR Patient Engagement Framework](#)).

## Application

Applicants interested in SCPOR partnership funding must complete an additional submission prior to the SHRF application deadline ([via survey](#)) that addresses the research's relevance to SCPOR's mandate to support patient-oriented and how the knowledge gained could be used to improve patient care and Saskatchewan's health system.

Survey answers must be written for a non-scientific audience. The SCPOR Patient Partner Review Committee will evaluate responses using the Patient-Oriented Research Level of Engagement Tool (PORLET) to determine eligibility and priority position for SCPOR partnership funding. ## Partnership Grant Selection Process

Only applications that receive passing scores (i.e., minimum score of 3 on each PORLET category) through patient review conducted by SCPOR are eligible for SCPOR partnership grant funding. SCPOR will inform SHRF of applications that meet the POR requirements prior to peer review.

Following peer review conducted by SHRF as part of the larger competition, the grant(s) with the highest score received through the SCPOR Patient Partner review process that also receive a final score of 3.8 or higher through SHRF's peer review process will be selected as the SCPOR partnered grant(s). (Should there be no grant scoring over 3.8 through SHRF's peer review process, then the highest scoring grant that also passed SCPOR patient review will be selected.)

**NOTE:** Grants that do not pass SCPOR Patient Partner review and grants that pass Patient Partner review but are not selected as a SCPOR partnered grant are returned to the general pool and eligible for SHRF Addictions Focus area funding based on peer review score.

Please note that in this circumstance projects must be feasible without SCPOR supports, including data supports, or it may not be eligible for SHRF Addictions Focus area funding in the general pool. 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## Eligibility to Apply

### Multiple Applications

Applicants are restricted to one application per year to the Solutions Program in the role of Principal Applicant. Please refer to the [Eligibility Check section](#) regarding applications that may fit more than one focus area.

### Re-Applications

Previously unsuccessful applicants are encouraged to revise and resubmit their applications, taking into consideration peer reviewer feedback and current program guidelines. The application form provides space to respond to previous review comments.

### Renewal

Funding is non-renewable. Previous recipients may apply with a new project or advance their work from an Innovation Grant to an Impact Grant with a new proposal. The application form provides a field to discuss previous research progress and potential overlap.

## Applicant Eligibility

### Project Roles Overview

Individuals and organizations participating in the proposed research fall in to three categories: applicants, personnel (i.e., trainees and research staff) and supporters. An individual can only fulfill one of the following roles on a given application:

- **Applicants/ Investigators** are individuals who contribute to the intellectual or scientific direction of the proposed work. They share responsibility for the direction of the proposed activities. They are designated as Principal Applicant, Co-Principal Applicant or Co-Applicant based on their level of leadership responsibility and involvement. Individuals in these roles may be researchers, knowledge users or people with lived/living experience
- **Personnel (Trainees and Research Staff)** are individuals tasked to carry out aspects of the research project and compensated from the grant funds
- **Supporters** are individuals or organizations who provide a specific service in a limited and defined role in the proposed activities, have an interest in the research outcomes (i.e., knowledge user organization), or represent private industry.

## Project Team Requirements

The Solutions Program aims to support research with the potential to make a difference in Saskatchewan for the selected focus area. Therefore, research teams should be collaborative and constituted to support the goals of the proposed research and potential impacts, with the program purpose and opportunity objectives in mind.

The following minimum team requirements must be met at both eligibility and application submission:

- Two (2) Saskatchewan-based researchers from different disciplines as applicants, including one of whom meets the eligibility requirements for a Principal Investigator
- One (1) Saskatchewan-based knowledge user applicant
- Any additional team membership requirements listed in a relevant focus area or partnered focus
- Having people with lived/living experiences on the team is strongly encouraged. Once the minimum team member requirements are met, additional team members from within or outside Saskatchewan may be included in any role
- There is no maximum number of team members; however, all team members should have a clear role and demonstrate how their expertise and/or experience is beneficial in addressing the research question(s) and/or potential impacts
- To support mentorship and capacity building, teams are encouraged to have both early career and established investigators, with trainees as appropriate. Novice and early career researchers applying as the Principal Investigator are encouraged to include experienced co-lead(s)
- Having relevant supporters, including health system decision-makers, community leaders, community organizations, industry partners, etc. are strongly encouraged, as appropriate for the proposed project.

## Allowable Expenses

Allowable expenses are those necessary to carry out the proposed activities and are not provided through other means. Budgets are reviewed carefully and should include only those expenses allowed and necessary for the proposed research.

Include **in-kind** and **other sources of funding** required to complete the proposed research in the budget and justification.

Refer to the [SHRF Funding Guide](#) for important policies which apply to all SHRF programs.

In addition, the Solutions Program:

- Does not provide funding for costs explicitly associated with preparing future grant applications
- Does not fund equipment purchases. In cases where a minor exception may be required to complete objectives, prior to the application deadline, please consult SHRF who will review the request and provide a decision. See current [SHRF Funding Guide](#) for equipment definition
- Requires any industry partner to provide cash or in-kind contributions in an amount equal or greater than 50% of any reimbursement received from the grant for goods and services
- Permits release time allowance to allow participation of a knowledge-user in the activities directly related to the proposed research. See current [SHRF Funding Guide](#) for more information
- Limits travel to academic conferences for dissemination purposes to a maximum of \$3,000. Open access publication fees or knowledge sharing in other formats may be in addition, but the total cost of academic focused knowledge sharing should not exceed 10% of the total budget request
- Requires some budget or in-kind resources supporting the sharing of knowledge gained with stakeholders and/or target audiences outside the academic community.

## Application and Review Process

Applying to this program involves two steps: 1) Eligibility Check; and 2) Application. Both steps must be completed and submitted online using the SHRF Research Management System (RMS).

### Eligibility Check

The purpose of the eligibility check is to ensure the following:

- The application is submitted to the appropriate funding opportunity, including relevance to the purpose and objectives of the focus area
- The Principal Applicant meets eligibility
- Minimum team requirements are met
- As applicable, selection of partner focus area with justification of the fit
- Facilitate the establishment of the peer review committees. Please identify appropriate reviewers with expertise to the proposed project
- Inform partners of interest in partnered funding
- Ensure communication and decisions are shared with applicants and reviewers.

The Eligibility Check is conducted internally by the Program Manager, following the above principles, confirming eligibility only. Eligibility submissions for partner funding opportunities will be anonymized and provided to the funding partner for initial review and feedback on the fit of the project. If questions arise regarding eligibility, SHRF will contact the Principal Applicant for further clarification, and may require that revisions be submitted. Multiple revisions can occur until a final decision is made or the eligibility revisions deadline has passed.

**NOTE:** Principal Applicants are permitted one (1) application to the Solutions Program per competition year, regardless of focus area or funding opportunity. Applications must clearly identify the focus area and partner opportunity (if applicable) at eligibility and develop their proposal to address that focus area and any additional partner requirements, as applicable. To maximize funding envelopes, the Program Manager will note where applications may be relevant and therefore eligible for funding under more than one focus area.

The Eligibility Check is a rolling intake up until the cut-off; therefore, it is strongly suggested that the Principal Applicant complete this step at their earliest convenience for a timely review and response from SHRF. Eligibility checks submitted after the cut-off date will not be accepted. Any revision request must be completed by the eligibility revision deadline, or it will not be accepted and the application will not be permitted to proceed.

## Full Application Review Process and Funding Recommendations

Full applications are evaluated in a competitive, peer-review process according to SHRF's [Research Funding Peer Review Committee Guidelines](#). Applications are assigned to a multidisciplinary committee whose members are from outside Saskatchewan, but within Canada.

Applicants will receive written comments from lead reviewers on the committee, along with any external reviewers assigned to the application.

## Review Criteria

Peer reviewers use the following criteria when evaluating applications. Scores are based on the SHRF 5-point scale, which is fully described in SHRF's [Research Funding Peer Review Committee Guidelines](#). Applications should score a minimum of 3.5 on each of the three criteria to be considered for funding.

## Quality of Proposal (50%)

### Approach:

- Clarity of the project goals, objectives and deliverables
- Quality and feasibility of the research design
  - Standards relevant to the field of study are met
  - Adherence to principles of ethical research is in place
  - For research involving Indigenous Peoples, appropriate consideration of [TCPS2: Chapter 9 – Research Involving First Nations, Inuit and Métis Peoples of Canada](#)
  - Where applicable and appropriate, the research design is sex and gender equitable
- Methodological approach(es), study design and analysis plans are well-described, appropriate, innovative and relevant to the research goals and objectives. Potential difficulties/pitfalls are identified and strategies outlined to address them.

### Team composition:

- Project brings together diverse skills and perspectives appropriate to address the health challenge and research question(s)
- Roles and responsibilities clearly outlined
- Appropriateness of knowledge user to carrying out planned research activities to achieve intended outcomes. Meaningful engagement is evident
- Appropriateness of academic researchers' expertise and experience for carrying out the planned research activities and achieving intended outcomes
- Experience and track record of the team members are strong relative to career stage, with a demonstrated appropriate level of productivity, originality and impact of scientific contributions
- Appropriateness of involvement of people with lived experience, as applicable

### Workplan:

1. Project steps and timelines are clear and reasonable
2. Role, responsibilities and time commitments are clear and reasonable
3. Project goals and objectives are feasible
4. Communication and team engagement plan is in place

### Resources:

- Budget justification for the proposed activities is appropriate. There are indications of financial and in-kind contributions from other sources, where appropriate
- Appropriate and supportive research environment, including space, equipment, staff and other supports that are necessary to do the research

### Overall readability

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### Relevance and Need (25%)

- Relevance of proposed research in addressing Saskatchewan health challenges and the selected focus area(s)
- Demonstration of the contextual need for this research in Saskatchewan and convincing scientific rationale
- Relevance and value-add of knowledge user applicants, people with lived experience and supporting individuals or organizations, as appropriate
- Intended impacts in each of the categories of the [Canadian Academy of Health Sciences \(CAHS\) ROI Framework](#) are important and well described: evidence of capacity building for addressing issues relevant to Saskatchewan; advancement of knowledge and contribution to our understanding of important health issues; informing decision making and consideration of potential health, social and/or economic impacts

### Potential for Impact (25%)

- Significance of expected contributions for Saskatchewan and the selected focus area(s)
- Potential of expected contributions to advance research to the next stage, according to the funding opportunity selected:
  - Innovation grants: catalyze innovative new ideas and approaches, promoting creative problem solving
  - Impact grants: advance the translation of research into real world settings and practical applications
- Strategies and plans to mobilize knowledge with stakeholders and target audiences are clear and appropriate, both within and outside the academic community

## Application Instructions

This section reflects the information asked in the SHRF RMS. It identifies each tab, field and how the information will be requested for all stages of the application. Mandatory fields are marked with an asterisk (\*).

All information for the Eligibility Check and Application stages are entered in the SHRF RMS and submitted electronically. No other materials should be sent to SHRF. At the Eligibility stage, only the Application Details and Eligibility tabs will be visible on your application. After your eligibility has been submitted, reviewed and approved, your application will be pushed to full application, where you will have access to the rest of the application tabs. At this stage, you will no longer be able to edit the eligibility information. Eligibility information will not be seen by the reviewers and is used for internal purposes.

**NOTE:** The Innovation and Impact grants have similar fields. The differences are in the application requirements and are clearly marked in this Application Instructions section. Be sure you have selected the correct funding opportunity (Innovation or Impact) before starting your application.

### Completing Your Personal Profile

**Personal Profile in the RMS must be completed by the Principal Investigator prior to submitting the full application.** It is strongly encouraged that all Project Role individuals, especially co-principal and co-applicants, complete their SHRF RMS profiles, but it is not a requirement at this time. The information collected in the Personal Profile will help SHRF understand the demographics of our applicants and guide us to ensure that we are upholding our values and strategic direction.

To access your Personal Profile, you will need to be on the RMS home page, where you can see a person icon titled "Personal Profile". Click on the icon and complete all required fields, then click "Save Draft" and "Save" to confirm the Personal Profile is complete. You can change your information at any time, ensuring that changes are saved using the above process.

### Choosing the Association/Organization where Funding will be Held

With the updated RMS, you can have multiple Associations/Organizations tied to one single profile. This function gives the Principal Investigator the chance to choose which Association/Organization funding should be held at, if successful in the competition. The Principal Investigator will need to confirm that the Association/Organization they wish to apply under is eligible to hold SHRF funds.

**The Association/Organization must be chosen prior to starting the application.** To change from one Association/Organization to another, you will need to be on your home page. In the

top right corner of your screen, there is a building icon. When you click on the icon, a drop down of your Associations/Organizations will appear, where the organization that is chosen for the application is selected. Once the correct Association/Organization is selected, the page will reload, and the available Funding Opportunities will be open to start an application.

## Adding Individuals

Individuals can be invited to the application at both the Eligibility and Application stages, as either Applicants/Investigators, Personnel or Supporters (role definitions can be found in the [SHRF Funding Guide](#)).

In the Solutions Program, research teams should be collaborative and constituted to support the goals of the proposed research and potential impacts, with the program purpose and opportunity objectives in mind. Specific team requirements for both the Impact and Innovation grants are as follows:

- Two (2) Saskatchewan-based researchers from different disciplines as applicants, including one that meets the eligibility requirements for a Principal Investigator
- One (1) Saskatchewan-based knowledge user applicant
- Any additional team membership requirements listed in a relevant focus area or partnered focus

If applicable, list the Department you are affiliated with.

### \* Is this a resubmission of a previously unsuccessful application to a SHRF competition?

Please answer "Yes" or "No". No further information will be required at this time.

### \* Is the proposed project a renewal or a continuation of a previously funded project?

Please answer "Yes" or "No". If you answer "Yes" a follow up question will appear. If you answer "No" you will move on to the next question.

### \* Please identify the previous funding source, including the funder and competition name.

You will be given a text box to identify the previous funding source.

### Project Roles

### Applicant/Investigators

Applicant/Investigators are individuals who contribute to the intellectual or scientific direction of the proposed work. They share responsibility for the direction of the proposed activities. They are designated as Principal Applicant, Co-Principal Applicant, or Co-Applicant based on their level of leadership responsibilities and involvement. Individuals in these roles may have the following Project Role Descriptors: Researcher; Knowledge User; or People with Lived Experience. The Project Role Descriptor will be confirmed in the Eligibility Tab and again in the Contribution Form at full application. Individuals invited to the Applicant/ Investigator Project Role are considered Team Members and contribute to the Research Project Team Requirements.

### Personnel

Personnel (Trainees and Research Staff) are individuals tasked to carry out aspects of the research project and will be compensated from the grant funds. Individuals invited to this Project Role are not named to the grant (as they are compensated from it) and do not count towards the Research Team Project Requirements.

### Supporters

Supporters are individuals or organizations who provide a specific service in a limited and defined role in the proposed activities, have an interest in the research outcomes (i.e. knowledge user organization), or represent private industry. Individuals invited to this Project Role are not named to the grant and do not count towards the Research Team Project Requirements.

### Grant Writer

Grant Writers are individuals who support the Project Team in writing and pulling together the documentation for the application. They are not members of the Project Team.

### Eligibility Tab

The Eligibility Check is reviewed internally by the Program Manager. This information is not visible to the review committee. Once the eligibility is submitted and a decision is made, any information in this tab can no longer be modified. Team members may change in the full application stage. However, mandatory Research Project Team Requirements must still be met.

Survey answers must be written for a non-scientific audience and responses will be evaluated by the Patient Partner review committee to determine eligibility and priority position for SCPOR partnership funding.

Submissions will include the following:

1. Patient-Oriented research projects must describe how they meet a minimum score of "3" in each criterion of the [Patient-Oriented Research Level of Engagement Tool \(PORLET\)](#). The five equally weighted criteria used for evaluation by the Patient Partner reviewers are: patients are partners; patient-identified priorities; outcomes important to patients; integration of knowledge into practice; and team is multi-disciplinary. The patient reviewers will evaluate the degree to which a given project meets POR criteria as defined by Strategy for Patient-Oriented Research (SPOR) using the [PORLET and PORLET Companion Document](#) as a guide. For suggestions from Patient Partner reviewers for writing strong POR proposals using the PORLET, [click here](#).
2. If applicable, Indigenous research projects must describe how they meet a minimum score of "3" in each criterion of the [Indigenous Research Level of Engagement Tool \(IRLET\)](#). The IRLET is intended to be used in conjunction with the PORLET and measures the degree to which a given project meets POR criteria in the context of Indigenous communities. Four equally weighted criteria used for evaluation by the Patient Partner reviewers are: partnership with Indigenous stakeholders; knowledge into practice; strengths-based approach; and Indigenous knowledges and ways of knowing.   - Training is available to all team members at no cost. Patient Partner honoraria will be provided by SCPOR for these sessions and does not need to be included within your budget.
2. In addition to SHRF reporting requirements, SCPOR partnership grant recipients are required to submit annual progress reports and/or an end-of-grant final report to SCPOR. To demonstrate the outcomes and impacts of funding, SCPOR will require additional follow-up reporting.
